In 1965, community leaders came together to provide low-income residents with the power and tools to grow economic opportunities and solve community problems. Since then, Community Action Partnership of Orange County has continued to embody that spirit of hope to improve our community and make Orange County a better place to live. With each milestone, we have grown to meet



the increasing needs of Orange County. For the past 50 years, we have been ending hunger and poverty by helping people help themselves and each other build vibrant communities that create pathways out of poverty.

To help people move out of poverty, CAPOC built community centers,



launched youth and adult employment programs, emergency food and nutrition programs, mobile health services, utility assistance, weatherization, afterschool and day care programs, transportation programs for seniors and the disabled, emergency housing, Farm 2 Families, Headstart, Legal Aid Society, Neighborhood Youth Corps, Community Technology Partnership, First Things First, Backpacks for Success and Community Mentor Partnership.

Poverty is still with us today. Millions of OC residents struggle to find decent paying jobs or work low-wage jobs that leave families without the resources to lead a healthy life. Decades of research has shown us that our services alleviate the symptoms of poverty in low-income communities by giving individuals the tools needed to succeed. We are dedicated to directing resources to helping kids succeed, providing



financial stability, and working with leaders to create jobs, and return prosperity to communities left behind in the new economy. Our continued commitment to the poor will open more opportunities for Americans and strengthen our society and economy for the future.

When families work through our programs, they develop greater confidence and motivation to manage setbacks in their lives. At Community Action Partnership, the answer lies in empowering people to recognize and make use of their own unique strengths and resources in order to improve their lives. 

FRUITS & VEGGIES

CAPOC hosted a clean-up day at the Miracle Garden in Stanton's Tina/Pacific neighborhood. This community-driven garden is home to a number of individual plots as well as communal growing spaces where members grow fruits, vegetables, herbs, and flowers for their families to enjoy. The garden is pesticide and herbicide free and a number of the gardeners employ seed-saving techniques, supporting a rich yearly



harvest. Working together for just a couple of hours weeding and pruning, we were able to get an impressive amount of beautification and preparation done so that new seeds could be planted.

Free Shoes for Low-Income Children



Community Action Partnership of Orange County was selected as an official partner of "Payless Gives Shoes 4 Kids," which allowed us to provide 150 pairs of shoes to children in need.

A group of children served by CAPOC participated in a shoe-shopping trip at a Payless ShoeSource store in Anaheim on Saturday, January 10th. The children enjoyed shopping for and selecting their own pair of free new shoes. For many kids accustomed to used and handme-down shoes, this was their first pair of new shoes. "Looking around at the excited children upon receiving new shoes for the first time, I knew we were giving these children the steps needed to reach a brighter tomorrow" said Maribel Reyes, Director of CAPOC's Anaheim Independencia Family Resource Center.

Helping People & Changing Lives

Walter, a member of our Energy & Environmental Services Department outreach staff, was out conducting a home assessment for an 87 year old women who had no heat in her mobile home for 5 years. Our weatherization program works with low-income Orange County residents to fix minor home repairs and reduce energy consumption. We were able to replace her heater allowing her to live comfortably through the winter. When Walter received a heartfelt holiday card and a personal call where she was crying and thanking us so much for everything we had done, he knew he made a difference and changed her life for the better.

_FImpact of Tax Filing Services-

New Data Show Volunteer Tax Preparation Provides a Significant Benefit to Lower-Income Taxpayers.



Recently, the CFED (Corporation for Federal Development) released its new breakdown of national IRS data on last year's

tax season, which shows that volunteers helped over 3.2 million taxpayers get \$3.89 billion in tax refunds in 2014. Since filing an accurate tax return is critical to obtaining mortgages, small business loans, college financial aid and even citizenship, the efforts of volunteers help millions. CAPOC aims to help Orange County residents save and build wealth, stay out of poverty, and create a more prosperous future through communitybased tax assistance.

CAPOC's two family resource centers, Anaheim Independencia and El Modena, are providing free 2015 tax filing services for eligible low-income people. Appointments are required; please contact:

CAPOC'S IMPACT IN NUMBERS

With your support, we raised **\$1.6 million** that produced the following results to make a difference in 2015:

-Our OC Food Bank distributed **20,717,405** pounds of food to nearly **400** partners that served **194,914** low-income children, families, seniors, veterans, and individuals with disabilities

-We reached **249,023** low-income children and their families through our nutrition and physical education programs

-**3,170** seniors were provided with services to help them maintain their independence and access to needed services

-We provided minor home repairs and weatherized **1,527** lowincome homes that helped the poor reduce their utility bills

-**1,860** youth received backpacks filled with school supplies at the start of the school year

-12 students received their GED through our ACCESS program at our El Modena Resource Center
